because I have a keen interest in new people, new cultures, and new values. My interest was increased when one of my friend visited the U.S. in 2013 and told me about American peoples and American culture.

Finally, my dream came into reality and I was selected for spring semester, 2015. It was an unforgettable moment of my life when I received the selection call from USEFP (United Education Foundation Pakistan). Special thanks to Global UGRAD Pakistan, the U.S. Department of State and IREX (International Research & Exchanges Board) for fulfilling my dream.

My visit to the U.S. started on December 15, 2014 by participation in pre-departure orientation at Islamabad. I arrived in Washington D.C. on Jan 2nd 2015. I was very excited along with my 120 colleagues at the National 4H Youth Conference Centre, where the Welcome Workshop was arranged by IREX. IREX staff was very kind and helpful. We had different activities including cultural nights and a tour of Washington D.C. These were the most memorable days of my life.

I have experienced different things and situations. Life is totally independent here; people are busy in their own lives. People are really helpful, kind, and cooperative, and very sincere, punctual, and honest with their work. They might not be your good friends, but you will find them better than good friends in times of need. The idea of cooperation has been induced in their student life through community service. Every institution encourages their students to participate in community service. The most loving moment is when people meet you with smiling faces--I really like that.

Let me share my experience as well as a good story: After the 9/11 attacks and certain American foreign policies, Afghani and some Pakistani peoples thought that American government and civilians are anti-Islamic and want to remove Islam from the world.

So when I was coming to the U.S., everyone asks me, "Are you going to USA? Americans will consider you a terrorist because you have a large beard. At least you should remove your beard." I was so confused and thought of withdrawing from the program and missing this opportunity. But one of my friends who lived in the U.S. convinced me that no one asks about your religion and your beliefs. But when I started my journey and entered Islamabad International Airport, I met with a man who lived in the U.S. for forty years. After an introduction he asked me, "Where are you going?" I said, "To the U.S." He looked amazed and said to me, "You and America?"

I said, "Yes, what is the reason? Please explain." He said to me that I would be facing many problems. I asked why. He said, Shave your beard at least for five months because in the U.S., people consider every Pakistani, and especially those who have beards, terrorists. I became so sad and nervous, but I accepted the challenge because I love challenges.

After a sixteen hour flight, I arrived at Washington's international airport. I was so tired and wondered who would first call me a terrorist. I thought the airport security will search me, and will ask about terrorists, my religion and beard, and say that people with beards are terrorists. "Are you a terrorist?"

But when I came out from the airport, no one asked the above question for which I was mentally ready.

I said, in my heart, I can face these questions in the next days. After four days in Washington and forty days in New Mexico, I have not faced these questions yet. No one has asked me about my religion and terrorists. And I hope no one asks me in my remaining days.

Now I want to remove the misunderstanding of my local peoples which they have about America and American people--that they are anti-Islamic.

Secondly, I have been studying the Holy Bible every Sunday. I have come to understand the Christian concept of God, the genesis of the world, and all prophets. I was completely amazed and surprised that I found the concept of God extremely similar to Islam.

Before this, I thought that Christianity was totally different from my religion, but found much more similarity about God and the origination of the Universe.

This golden opportunity of being an exchange participant is a life changing experience for me so far.

There are cultural differences like food, and some culture shock adjusting to the new environment, with new people, new language; and new teachers. They are difficult but, at the same time, fun too.

Simply in conclusion, I can say even though there are both bad and good times in international visits, they are always joyful and full of experience.

The FAO organization concerns the CELAC program of UNM because of CELAC's presence of international students. The FAO is a worldwide organization that speaks to an

Niagara Falls

Niagara Falls are a group of waterfalls located on the Niagara River in eastern North American, on the border between the U.S. and Canada. Located about 236 meters above sea level, its fall is approximately 52 meters.

Niagara Falls is comprised of three wateralls: the Canadian waterfall called The Horseshoe, the American waterfall, and Bridal Veil Waterfall, which is smaller. Although not a great height, they are very spacious and are the largest in North America because through them flows all the water from the Great Lakes.

Since they were discovered by European settlers, they have become very popular, not only for their beauty, but also as a source of energy and a challenging project for environmental preservation. They are a place of tourism shared by the cities of Niagara Falls (New York) and Niagara Falls (Ontario).

The name "Niagara" comes from an Iroquois word meaning "thunder of water." The original inhabitants of the region were the Ongiara, an Iroquis tribe considered neutral by French conquerors.

The best time of season to enjoy this beautiful place is May through June, when it is not too cold and the sun is shining in the sky. However, if you want to see lovely scenery, you can go December to January, to see the falls fully frozen

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international audience. The main subject of the meeting was the issue of food waste that occurs within the entire supply chain: production, post-harvest, marketing of products, processing, logistics, distribution and consumption of primary products and derivatives.

That waste (1.3 billion tons of food per year, still perfectly edible, of which 89 million tons come from the U.S.) is an issue at the center of the international debate for the social, political, economic and environmental aspects. This is especially an important issue in a period of crisis and contraction in household consumption.

"Better managing the issue of food waste," Dorothy Smith, Superintendent of the FAO stressed, "not only can produce an economic benefit for enterprises, but it also allows us to avoid the unnecessary consumption of natural resources--land, water, and energy-required in the various links of the chain ranging from the field to the table."

Smith went on to say that the question has so far been addressed mainly with regard to the large quantities of food products that are discarded, although still perfectly edible, especially in marketing and consumption.

Less analyzed is the phenomenon of food losses, which covers losses occurring at the production, harvest, processing, preservation, and storage due to climatic, organizational, technical and environmental factors. On these issues, FAO can make contributions in terms of analysis and identification of useful interventions for businesses and competent authorities.

During her speech, Smith also said that the FAO studies in depth the aspect of quality in production of food and groceries. It seems obvious: If food in many ways is cheaper, it is a result of bad production processes. And if people generate a lot of food waste, it is because the companies are able to produce and sell more than consumers can eat. Then the entire class of a product becomes cheaper and cheaper. "The issue of food waste," said Vice-Minister of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry of New Mexico, John Silva de Riviera, "is an issue of fundamental importance for the ministry, as it is the ideal subject to take the concepts of nutritional responsibility and the guarantee of food quality, healthiness and competitiveness in the international market."

According to Silva de Riviera, the contrast of waste is an issue that has different implications not only environmentally, but also socially and ethically. Four million people today find it difficult to feed themselves adequately.

The food chain issue is so complex that it includes the entire cycle of energy production and the chain of waste disposal. It also demands nutrition education in developed countries. Food waste is the most obvious form of discrimination between advanced countries and countries still not developed.

"This last component requires us to find policies and solutions that allow the recovery and reuse of all that can be saved in the supply chain," said Silva de Riveira.

Speakers also included Mary O'Connor (UNM), Jack Kovalski (University of Kiev), and Charles Dogerty of Presbyterian Hospital's Center for Food Nutrition.


